DENINITIONS

- Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL) The highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.
- Maximum Contaminant Level Goal (MCLG) -- The level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.
- ppb -- parts per billion.
- ppm -- parts per million.
- pCi/L picocuries per liter

- ND -- Not detected
- RAA Running Annual Average
- Treatment Technique (TT) A required process intended to reduce the level of a contaminant in drinking water.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water posed a health risk. More information about contaminants or potential health effects can be obtained by calling the Environmental Protection Agency's Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. EPA/CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by *Cryptosporidium* and other microbial contaminants are available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).

If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. STRATFORD MUNI WATER DEPT is responsible for providing high quality drinking water but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using water for drinking or cooking. If you are concerned about lead in your water, you may wish to have your water tested. Information on lead in drinking water, testing methods and steps you can take to minimize exposure is available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline or at http://www.epa.gov/safewater/lead.

ADDITIONAL HEALTH INFORMATION

Fluoride in children's drinking water at levels of approximately 1 mg/L reduces the number of dental cavities. However, some children exposed to levels of fluoride greater than about 2.0 mg/L may develop dental fluorosis. Dental fluorosis, in its moderate and severe forms, is a brown staining or pitting of the permanent teeth, or both.

Because dental fluorosis occurs only when developing teeth (before they erupt from the gums) are exposed to elevated fluoride levels, households without children are not expected to be affected by this level of fluoride.

Families with children under the age of nine are encouraged to seek other sources of drinking water for their children to avoid the possibility of staining and pitting.

Your water supplier can lower the concentration of fluoride in your water so you will still receive the benefits of cavity prevention while the possibility of stained and pitted teeth is minimized. Removal of fluoride may increase your water costs. Treatment systems are also commercially available for home use. Information on such systems is available at the address given by your public water supplier. Low fluoride bottled drinking water that would meet all standards is also commercially available.

SOURCE WATER ASSESSMENT INFORMATION

This water supply obtains its water from the limestone and dolomite of the Mississippian aquifer. The Mississippian aquifer was determined to have low susceptibility to contamination because the characteristics of the aquifer and overlying materials provide natural protection from contaminants at the land surface. The Mississippian wells will have low susceptibility to surface contaminants such as leaking underground storage tanks, contaminant spills, and excess fertilizer application. A detailed evaluation of your source water was completed by the Iowa Department of Natural Resources, and is available from the Water Operator at 515-838-2311.

SEASONAL REMINDERS

The Stratford Public Works Department would like to remind residents **not to blow grass, leaves,** or other debris into the street. These can potentially cause clogging of the storm sewers which may result in flooding and can result in costly repairs which are ultimately paid for by the taxpayers. Rain waters push grass, leaves and other debris that have blown into the street, down the curb line and into the storm drains. Stratford's Code of ordinance is as follows:

135.03 PLACING DEBRIS ON. It is *unlawful* for any person to throw or deposit on any street or alley any glass, glass bottle, nails, tacks, wire, cans, trash, garbage, rubbish, litter, offal, *leaves, grass* or any other debris likely to be washed into the storm sewer and clog the storm sewer, or any substance likely to injure any person, animal or vehicle. *(Code of Iowa, Sec. 321.369)*

Storm drains and storm sewers need to remain clear of grass, leaves, and other debris to allow storm waters to leave your area and drain out through the storm sewer system rather than backing up and causing flooding in your area.

If you have grass clippings and yard debris the city has a *yard waste only* site for the citizens of Stratford. Come up to City Hall and ask for a key to access the City owned debris site. Anyone living within Stratford's city limits may take *yard debris*, *grass clippings*, *leaves and small branches no larger than 4 inches in diameter*, to the site.

Regulations for 2023 City-Wide Clean-Up Day

The City of Stratford has GUIDELINES and RULES for the upcoming City-Wide Clean-Up Day on Saturday, May 6th. City residents must have items at the curbside by <u>7:00 am on Saturday</u>, <u>May 6th</u>. If you have any questions concerning regulations for the City-Wide Clean-Up Day call City Hall at 515-838-2311 or email <u>cityofstratford@globalccs.net</u>.

If out of towners bring their junk into Stratford and use a residential location to get rid of their junk during Stratford's Clean-Up Day -- NOTHING will be picked up at that location

The guidelines and rules are as follows:

- o No household trash. This should go in the regular weekly garbage pick-up.
- o No food items. These items should go in regular weekly garbage pickup.
- o No items from out-of-town residents or any location other than City of Stratford residents that reside in their homes.
- o No liquid or hazardous materials. (Contract Household Hazardous Waste Facility 955-2781)
- o No construction materials. (concrete or bricks)
- o No yard waste. Yard waste can be taken by property owner to city debris pile.
- No auto parts, chopped tires or car batteries.
- No propane tanks.
- o No large appliances or tires without pre-paid stickers.

The above-mentioned prohibited items will not be picked up. If collection crews find prohibited items mixed in with other materials to be picked up, none of the items at curbside will be collected from that residence.

<u>Large appliance guidelines:</u> (Maximum of 3 large appliances) All large appliances that need to be picked up require a pre-paid sticker on it. The cost for **each** pre-paid sticker will be <u>\$15.00</u>. Large appliances include washers, dryers, freezers, stoves, microwaves, humidifiers, air conditioners, water heaters, large TV's, and refrigerators. Call for other large items, they may require stickers.

<u>Tire guidelines:</u> (Maximum of 5 tires) All tires that need to be picked up require a pre-paid sticker on it. The cost for **each** pre-paid sticker depends on the size of the tire and if it includes a rim. Please contact City Hall if you have any questions.

Pre-paid stickers will be available at City Hall until 4:30 on Thursday, May 4th. The City of Stratford will not sell stickers after 4:30 on Thursday, May 4th.

If the whole town is experiencing an electrical power outage and Maintenance Staff doesn't answer, call Hamilton County Dispatch at 515-832-9500; or Midland Power Cooperative's emergency number, 1-800-286-2268. If all else fails, call 911.

Check for Leaks

Thawing can be difficult on pipes. Be sure to check joins and valves for leaks when turning on the water!

Lubricate Hinges

Check Ceiling Fans

Set the ceiling fans to rotate in a counterclockwise direction so that cool air will blow downward.
